Jesus voiced this complaint against the Laodicean church: they were in their relationship to Him.
To be "cold" is to be, even opposed to the things of God. To be "hot" implies a passionate, life of faith and service. To be "lukewarm" is to be devoted and faithful if not Surely lukewarmness is than being cold. Why would Jesus consider spiritual lukewarmness the most unpleasant and useless to Him? The Parable of the Prodigal Son helps us answer that question.
In the parable there are two sons. The older was an obedient, compliant, and son. The younger, not so much. He left home, fell on hard times, and, decided to go home. Surely, the older brother is the of the story.
But no. Once his brother comes home, we learn the truth about the older brother. His dutiful behavior masked a His never left home, but his was far from the father. This describes the lukewarm Christian—one who attends church regularly, gives more than a tip, though begrudgingly, serves occasionally if the service is easy and pleasant, and rarely thinks about the Lord or speaks to others about Him if not
Jesus seems to indicate lukewarmness has something to do with Their material well-being had allowed them to become self-satisfied, and their sense of spread to their spiritual lives as well.
But why would Jesus prefer a believer living an life (cold) to one with at least a of godliness (lukewarmness). Because just like the Prodigal Son, the cold son is much more likely to his wretchedness and A cold Christian is to the door of repentance than the lukewarm one.
Lukewarmness is among the most forms of Christianity found among church goers in America today.
